Mike's Rambling Corner

<u>Graduating Students.</u> At the commencement exercise at Morehouse College in Atlanta on May 20, the commencement speaker, **Robert F. Smith**, made the announcement that his family will provide grants to wipe out the 400 graduating class of their student loans. **Smith** is a billionaire. Many of the graduating students across the US are carrying huge student loan debts as they start to seek employment to repay this debt that carries about 6% interest rate. In the U.S. the student debts totals over \$ 1.5 trillion. Student loan debt is now the second highest consumer debt category, after mortgage debt, and higher than both credit cards and car loans. 44.2 million US borrowers have student loan debt.

Undergraduate tuition at UH-Manoa is projected at \$11,304 annually for Hawaii residents and \$33,336 for nonresidents in the 2019-20 academic year, with graduate tuition at \$15,912 for residents and \$37,392 for nonresidents. Personally, I cannot be thankful enough that my UH annual tuition fee was \$250 when I attended UH. I made enough at my pineapple cannery summer job to pay the tuition plus books for the school year. Those were the days when Hawaii was still a territory.

Fascinating Tidbits. The tenth president of the US has living grandchildren. **John Tyler** was born in 1790 and was inaugurated as president in 1841. He had 15 children (with two wives), including **Lyon Gardiner Tyler**, who was born in 1853, when former president **Tyler** was 63. **Lyon Tyler's** sons **Lyon Jr**. and **Harrison** (the president's grandsons) were both born in the 1920s and are still alive and well. On the subject of US presidents, **Martin Van Buren**, 8th president from 1837 to 1841, is the only president who spoke English as a second language (Dutch was his first).

Oranges Ward Off Macular Degeneration. An orange a day might keep macular degeneration away. The Westmead Institute for Medical Research in Australia, which conducted the study, found that people who ate an orange daily reduced their risk of getting this age-related visual impairment by up to 60 percent. In addition to vitamin C, oranges have flavonoids, which might explain the effect: These compounds prevent oxidative stress and reduces inflammation in the body.

Reason Your Fingers and Toes Wrinkle in Water. When you're in the bath, water seeping into your skin makes the upper layers swell. That causes the blood vessels below to constrict, which in turn causes some of the upper layers of skin to collapse. The irregular pattern of swelling and falling skin is what you see as wrinkles on our fingertips and toes.

Human Composting. Washington becomes the first state to allow human composting. This process will turn bodies into soil and relies on a mixture of materials, such as wood chips and straw to produce about two wheelbarrows worth of soil. This new state law will allow licensed facilities to offer the service. The law also allows loved ones to keep the soil in urns, similar to cremation, spread it in public lands or use it to grow plants on private property.
